

The Community Car scheme is run by Dave and Jean Ditton and is for residents aged 65 and over living in Easton, Marlingford or Colton. It's a great idea and a very useful service for those who need transport to doctor, dentist or the hospital. (Local buses are available for shopping trips - see page 5 for details).

So how does it work?

If you are going to need transport, you can ring **01603 880857** to arrange the pickup, but please try to give **two to three days notice** to give time for a driver to be assigned.

The cost for you will be 30p per



mile and you will pay the driver at the end of your journey.

The scheme also pays the driver 30p each mile and is supported by both parish councils and South Norfolk council.


Spiking a drink? It's not funny...and it's illegal

To spike a drink means to put alcohol or drugs into someone's drink without their knowledge or permission. The aim may be to incapacitate someone enough to rob or sexually assault them, although sometimes it is just intended as a joke – a bad joke as it is very dangerous.


There is also some concern at the possibility that people are being 'spiked' by needles/syringes containing drugs. Although this is much less likely than drink spiking, many of the same tips for staying safe can protect you here too. Spiking is a criminal offence and venues should take steps to ensure they are safe places to be, but you still need to protect yourself, particularly if you feel unsafe.

Tips to stay safe

 Plan your night out, including your journey there and back. Make sure the venue you are going to is licensed – venues are required to take steps to ensure the safety of their customers



avoid going alone. Friends can look out for one another.



- Think very carefully about whether you should leave a place with someone you've just met.
- Make sure your mobile phone has plenty of charge in it before you leave home and keep your mobile safe.

Would you know how to use a defibrillator?

Well, it's a normal day until suddenly, you are in the presence of someone having a heart attack.
You call 999 and are told there is a defibrillator in your area. Would you know how to use one?
Here's a guide to where you can find them in our community and how to use them.

on by pressing the green button.

Step 2: Peel off the sticky pads and attach them to the patient's skin, one on each side of the chest, as shown in the picture on the defibrillator.

Step 3: Once the pads have been attached, stop CPR and don't

touch the patient. The defibrillator will then check the patient's heart rhythm.

Step 4: The defibrillator will decide whether a shock is needed and if so, it will tell you to press the shock button. An automatic defibrillator will shock the patient without prompt. Don't touch the patient while they are being shocked.

Step 5: The defibrillator will tell

you when the shock has been delivered and whether you need to continue CPR.

Step 6: Continue with chest compressions until the patient shows signs of life or the defibrillator tells you to stop so it can analyse the heartbeat again. The device checks the heart rhythm and will only tell you to shock if it's needed. You can't shock someone accidentally.

Where they are located

- Easton: your nearest defibrillator is on the wall at Easton community centre, Marlingford Rd, NR9 5AD.
- Colton: your nearest defibrillator is on the wall of Colton village hall on Norwich Road, NR9 5BY.
- Marlingford: your nearest defibrillator is near the gate at The Bell pub, Bawburgh Road, NR9 5HX.

How to use one

If you're on your own, don't interrupt CPR (heart massage) to go and find a one. If possible, send someone else.

Anyone can use a defibrillator and you don't need training.

Step 1: Once you have accessed a defibrillator by dialling 999, turn it

Ann embarks on the pilgrimage of a lifetime

This summer, Colton resident Ann Dunn made a journey she'll never forget. Here she recalls the experience.



The Camino de Santiago, or the Way of St James, is a long-distance footpath, with a difference. People have been walking it as a pilgrimage route for over a thousand years. There are a number of routes, but the 800-kilometre route from St Jean Pied de Port in Southern France to Santiago de Compostela in Galicia, Northern Spain, is the most popular route and has changed little since medieval times.

For years it had been on my bucket list to do this pilgrimage, and early in 2022, I decided to take the bull by the horns and do the pilgrimage in May and June of this year. The first thing I did was to send off for

my Credential or pilgrim's passport, the official accreditation identifying you as a pilgrim and which is required for accommodation at the hostels along the way.

Physically, I didn't prepare a lot (to my subsequent regret).

I am a fairly fit 73-year-old — walking the dog a few miles a day is about the height of my physical exercise. I equipped myself with a 40-litre rucksack packed with the basic necessities of living on the road, a portable watercolour painting set and off I went.

I travelled on from Biarritz to St Jean Pied de Port by train and bus. I can't say that I wasn't nervous. I was. Very. But my first night at the hostel in St Jean set my mind at ease.

I met up with a group of single travellers, some of whom I would meet again on my 39-day pilgrimage.

Setting off through the Pyrenees, I realised almost immediately that I had made two miscalculations -I wasn't as fit as I thought I was and, despite my careful planning, my rucksack was still too heavy even at only seven kilos. From the start, I struggled with the uphill walking from St Jean, having to stop every 10 to 20 paces to catch my breath, shoulders aching from the weight of my backpack, feet dragging me up the steep slopes, while fitter, younger pilgrims raced past me. Now, I honestly questioned my sanity in doing this trip. What a relief it was to reach the first hostel, when, after a beer and meeting up again with my new companions, my struggles were all but forgotten.

The Pyrenees scenery was spectacular with mountain tops and wild horses appearing out of the mist in the early morning.

Soon I was in the midst of a beautiful spring day, as cuckoos called and lizards scampered across the path in front of me. Trekking on to Roncesvalles monastery, I felt elated and more accustomed to the tough going. In the mountains I experienced rainy days when I was soaked to the skin and, instead of the flash of lizards, huge black slugs trailed across the path. Always, it was such a relief to reach the hostel. to shower away the heat of the day and afterwards to drink and eat with the people you had got to know on the way. Some of the hostels prepared communal meals which were inexpensive and nutritious. You got used to sleeping in mixed gender dormitories and, although some people complained, I always slept so soundly as to not be bothered much by the grunts and snores of the other pilgrims. How lovely it was to walk down from the mountains with unpredictable terrain and weather, to lower ground, through the vineyards of la Rioja, olive groves and meadows brimming with abundant wild flowers. However, Spain was about to experience a heatwave – and I

really wasn't prepared for that...
