

Pay just £2 single bus fare until end of March

Passengers are being encouraged to **Get Around for £2** by bus from January to March this year, with bus operators' campaign to promote the government fare cap scheme. The scheme will help families, commuters and other passengers save money this winter, backed by £60 million of government investment to cap single tickets at £2 from 1 January to 31 March 2023 across England, outside London.

Nine bus operators in Norfolk are taking part in the Bus Fare Cap Grant scheme.

This means that a single journey on all services run by these operators between 1 January – 31 March 2023 will cost no more than £2. Operators taking part are: **BorderBus; First; Konectbus; Our Bus; Sanders; Simonds Coach Services; Stagecoach; Semmence.** With the average single local bus ticket costing £2.80, passengers will save almost a third of the ticket price per journey. In some rural areas a single ticket can cost more than $\pounds 5$.

The scheme seeks to get more commuters on buses and helps to reduce emissions and congestion by taking an estimated 2 million cars off the roads.

The government has confirmed more than 130 bus operators, such as National Express and Stagecoach, managing routes from the north to the south of England will charge no more than £2 for their single tickets, helping passengers with travel costs for education, work and medical appointments.

Loving your new bike? Protect it from theft!

Did you get a new bicycle for Christmas? These are an attractive target for thieves. Here are some tips to help keep your bike secure:

• Always lock your bike with at least one good quality lock.

• Ensure the lock is away from the ground and as tight as possible.

• Lock your bike to a secure purpose-made cycle stand or another immovable object.

• Leave your bike where it can be seen by passers-by and CCTV.

• Remove or secure removable parts. Don't buy a bike you suspect may be stolen – you can check if a bike is stolen prior to purchase by visiting <u>bikeregister.com/bikechecker</u>



your bike in a secure shed or garage and keep the door locked. If you keep your bike in a shed, make sure you get a robust lock for the door. If you are going to keep your bike in a communal area, is there anything you can lock it

to? You can also put your bike on the Bike Register which allows you to register your bike details on a national police approved database for free. Registering your bike means that if it is stolen, you could be reunited with it. You can also purchase a Security Marking Kit to help reduce the chances of becoming a victim of cycle theft. You will need photo ID next time you vote...

From 4 May 2023, voters in England will need to show photo ID to vote at polling stations in some elections.



This will apply to:

- Local elections
- Police and Crime Commissioner elections
- UK parliamentary by-elections
- Recall petitions

From October 2023 it will also apply to UK General elections.

You can use any of the following accepted forms of photo ID when voting at a polling station:

• **Passport** issued by the UK, any of the Channel Islands, the Isle of Man, a British Overseas Territory, an EEA state or a Commonwealth country

• **Driving licence** issued by the UK, any of the Channel Islands, the Isle of Man, or an EEA state (this includes a provisional driving licence).

- Blue Badge
- Older Person's Bus Pass
- Disabled Person's Bus Pass

You can still use your photo ID if it's out of date, as long as it looks like you. The name on your ID should be the same name you used to register to vote.

You can apply for a free voter ID document known as a Voter Authority Certificate, if:

• you don't have an accepted form of photo ID

• you're not sure whether your photo ID still looks like you

• you're worried about using an existing form of ID for any other reason, such as the use of a gender marker.

If you're registered to vote anonymously and want to vote in person, you'll need to apply for an Anonymous Elector's Document. For more information on which photo ID documents are accepted and how to register for a free voter ID document, click:

When daily anxiety rules, it's time to take action

Anxiety is a normal emotion that everyone experiences from time to time. It's normal and healthy to feel anxious in certain situations. That's when it's time to act. These tips will help to reduce anxiety: 1 Take a deep breath: Taking slow, deep breaths is an easy way to calm your body down in the moment. Place one hand on your chest and the other on your stomach and take slow, deep breaths for a few minutes until you start to feel more relaxed. (Important: six seconds in through your nose, six seconds out through your nose and notice your belly rising and falling)

2 Go for a walk or run: Exercise helps relieve stress by releasing endorphins which are hormones that make you feel better and more relaxed. Even if you don't have time to go for a full workout, taking a short walk or jog will help reduce your anxiety levels quickly. 3 Practise meditation: Meditation is an excellent tool for reducing stress and calming the mind and body. Meditating for five minutes every day can make a profound difference in your life. If you've never done it before, all you do is sit down, focus on your breath, and anytime a thought comes into your mind, you just refocus on your breath. The end. And remember, it's called meditation practice for a reason - it takes a lot of practice to shut out noise and reduce anxiety. 4 Identify your triggers: Keeping track of what triggers your anxious feelings can be helpful in avoiding them in the future. Writing down how you felt before, during, and after an anxious episode can help you identify patterns and find solutions for managing future triggers more effectively. 5 Create a daily routine: Having structure in our lives is essential when it comes to managing stress levels. Creating a daily routine helps keep us organised by giving us something concrete to focus on each day — plus, it reduces decision fatigue by eliminating those pesky 'what should I do

now?' moments that lead us down rabbit holes of doubt and indecision.

6 Focus on something else:

Redirecting your attention away from what's causing your anxiety is one of the quickest ways to reduce it fast – focus on something else like reading a book or watching TV until your anxieties subside.

7 Get enough sleep: Getting enough quality sleep is essential for maintaining good mental health as well as reducing feelings of anxiety or depression. Aim for at least eight hours per night if possible; any less than this may result in decreased concentration levels or difficulty focusing on tasks throughout the day due to fatigue.

Everyone has different ways of dealing with anxiety; what works for one person might not work for another. However, these seven tips are great starting points if you're looking for ways to reduce your own stress levels quickly and effectively – try them out today! Remember that managing anxiety takes practice – don't give up if things don't get better right away! Keep trying different strategies until you find something that works best for you! Good luck!

Parish council budget 2023/24

At the January parish council meeting, the council set the budget for 2023-24. The precept was set at $\pm 10,900$ – an increase of 4% from the previous year.

The precept is the portion of money from residents' council tax that is allocated to the parish council. More information can be found on your council tax bill which will be sent out by South Norfolk Council in the spring.

It was agreed to allocate money towards the maintenance of Marlingford churchyard and Colton churchyard and also to support the production of Grapevine magazine.

Marlingford Conservation Area

With spring around the corner, work is planned on Marlingford Conservation Area to continue to make it a space for all to enjoy and where wildlife can thrive. To allow this, it is hoped various jobs be undertaken over forthcoming months including clearing overgrown areas and building wood piles to act as habitats for wildlife. Gazelles Valentine run Sunday road closure

The Norfolk Gazelles Valentine's 10k, is planned to run on the Sunday February 12 from 9.45am to 12.00pm. Runners will leave Easton College at 10am. The route starts at the college and then goes north up Bawburgh Road joining the Dereham Road and then through the villages of Colton, Marlingford, finishing back at the college. In order to ensure the safety of runners, marshals and spectators, a road closure order will be in force for a section of the route and diversions will limit two-way flow of traffic for the duration of the race. Access will

be maintained for residents and businesses when safe to do so but would ask that if possible, travelling along any of the sections of the route is avoided or is made with caution during the times indicated above. Road junctions will all be manned with CSAS-approved marshals to ensure the safety of all concerned and support the diversion of traffic. New Easton Community Centre

Easton parish councillors met on January 9, 2023 and discussed the progress made to deliver the new community centre. As residents will know,

because of the growth of our village taking us from 600 homes to 1,500 over the next few years, our current facilities will not be able to offer the range of services a growing community needs. The council now has planning permission for the new centre and work started on site the week of the January 9, 2023.

The centre will create a positive impact on our growing community (and further) across all age groups. Our new community centre will encourage inter-generational mixing with different groups of differing abilities, bringing together large diversities of people from within the community, all using the facilities at the same time. The new building will offer a main hall – at least 18m x 10m – two separate meeting rooms, a lounge, a bar servicing the lounge and meeting rooms, a lending library, a commercial-grade kitchen, a 'blue light' office space offering 24-hour access to our blue light services. There will be EV charging at 50kw,

22Kw and some 7kw chargers 24/7 with reduced rates for residents. It is hoped the local clubs and groups in our community will make full use of the new facilities and that it will be a hub offering a large and varied range of activities for all. The building is also designed to be a relief centre, able to operate off the grid for an extended period creating resilience in the community. With a low carbon footprint and low maintenance costs, the project will combine new building and green environmental technologies to create a sustainable centre which will serve Easton residents for many years to come. Funds for the project are £505k from The Greater Norwich Development Fund, £500K from a South Norfolk

Council Company Investment grant and Easton Parish Council will fund the rest from remaining Community Infrastructure Levy money. Build costs have gone up to about £2million. However, by using SIPs building, the council can reduce costs to about £1.8million. A number of local companies, including MKM Building Supplies, Screwfix and Midsummer Energy, have agreed to supply materials at a vastly reduced cost which will ensure the council is able to deliver this much-needed project for the benefit of the whole community. The project is on course to have the building up and running in the Autumn of 2023.

Speeding

Regrettably it was reported at the January meeting that cars are still speeding through the village. This is regularly reported to the police who do respond and often send the camera team to catch offenders. However, as there are still significant speeding offenders, it was suggested that a zero-tolerance policy be adopted which is to be discussed with the local police. It was noted friendly warnings do not save children's lives.

Precept request for financial year 2023–24

The budget and precept amount for the financial year 2023–24 was

discussed at the January meeting and an overall increase of around 2.5% was agreed. It was noted the council had good reserves which could prevent large increases in line with current inflation rates. This allowed the parish council to keep the precept request down with a final figure of £22,488 across a tax base of 528 properties. The average Band D property will see an increase of around £1.02 per annum which will equate to an increase of approximately 8.5 pence per month.

New waste bins

It has been noted the newly installed litter bins are being

misused as all items are being placed in them. Items for recycling are not being placed separately in the recycling bins. Please could residents be responsible in disposing of all waste correctly.

Community Car scheme no longer available to Marlingford and Colton residents

A decision by Marlingford and Colton Parish Council to end contributions towards the Community Car scheme has meant residents of those villages can no longer use the service. South Norfolk council funds half the scheme with the other half being shared by the two parish councils of Easton, and Marlingford and Colton. Dave Ditton who runs the scheme for residents aged 65 and over with wife, Jean, said: "It's a very useful service for those who need transport to doctor, dentist or the hospital and we regret that now we will not be able to provide transport for those in Colton and Marlingford".

The scheme remains available to residents of Easton at a cost of 30p per mile from the user and 30p per mile contributed by the councils. If you are going to need transport, you can ring **01603 880857** to arrange the pickup, but please try to give **two to three days notice** to give time for a driver to be assigned.
