

## Meet the cat who doesn't have nine lives...

Police are asking the public to take care after catalytic converter thieves targeted cars parked mainly in driveways across Norfolk. Of the targeted vehicles, 43% were either Toyota (mainly Auris and Prius) or Honda (predominantly Jazz, Civic or CR-V) models.

Keep vehicles in secure buildings or garages where possible, or in well-lit, less isolated areas. People can also look at getting a catloc device fitted which makes it far harder for thieves in a hurry to detach the unit. Vehicle owners can also get their catalytic converter protectively marked from some car

In the most recent thefts, they have noted:

• A team of three is often used – one lookout, one driver, and one cutting person.

Thefts occur in residential streets.
A distraction can be used, loud music, for example.

Generally, police suggest parking near a wall or fence to make access to the emission control devices more difficult and within CCTV or doorbell camera range, if possible. garages. Officers say the thieves sometimes pose as people who are doing maintenance working on a vehicle. As well as taking measures to protect your vehicle, prompt reporting is also key to catching the criminals. **Anyone spotting suspicious activity is advised not to make an approach and to call 999 immediately.**

# The Grapevine report

The Grapevine has had a good year and we are pleased that we were able to regain printing of the magazine quarterly in 2022. In 2023 we will continue to produce 10 issues: double issues for August/September and December/January. We hope to print a magazine every alternate issue, so enabling more of the villages' residents to take advantage of the news we bring them. We have 900 printed, of which 650 are for Easton, 110 for Colton and 100 for Marlingford with extra for leaving in village halls, church porches, etc. We have volunteers who deliver a copy to each home and business in the villages but we could use more volunteers to help distribute the magazine. The online version goes out every month and is distributed to all contributors, advertisers and committee contacts as well as those who have asked to be added to the online distribution list. The magazine is also uploaded to the parish councils' websites and a link is put on the Nextdoor website which covers Easton. Marlingford and Colton as well as part of west Norwich. October and November are busy months for us when we need to renew advertisers' interest in the

magazine. This year we were able to offer colour or black/white options. We are fortunate to have a good amount of loyal supporters and now a few new companies to add to our advertisers. In July, Easton Parish Council offered to help us with an annual contribution of £1000. We also received an annual payment from Marlingford & Colton Parish Council and a donation from Colton Village Hall Committee. Many thanks for your support. In October, we were presented with a £1000 grant from Persimmon homes as part of their Charity Community Fund. Our advertising revenue amounted to £3382.00 The brown envelope donation scheme, which is our only other source of income, raised £568.80 The magazine has developed over the year and hopefully readers are happy with the new version. The editor is always pleased to receive any articles with local interest and news. Our voluntary committee members are: Felicity Maton, Assistant Editor, Sally Neale and Carol Chiles, Treasurer. ## Gone fishin' - with Dom and Milt


#### A River Runs Through It...

# The Rambling Vine

Our new king – a passionate man of faith

The country is counting down to the Coronation of our new monarch, King Charles III on May 6. I don't know if you are a Royalist or not but whatever your views on the monarchy, it will undoubtedly be a national celebration to lift

public spirits at a time when it's most needed.

Of course, we don't know yet what sort of king our new king will be. Kings of the past have been a bit of a 'mixed bunch', - some were renowned on the battlefield, like Richard the Lionheart and some were wise and strategic leaders like Alfred the Great. Then there were the kings whose reigns had a difficult end like Harold with an unfortunate arrow in the eye, Charles I whose beheading heralded the only time in British history when we didn't have a monarch, and Richard III whose bones were found under a car park and to whom history, rightly or not, has not been kind.
