

#### **Colton churchyard car park improvements**

Many will know that the car park in the churchyard becomes very muddy during the winter months. Indeed, in recent years, we have tried to restrict usage to the hours around our monthly church service by keeping the bollard over the entrance. The carol service is always a challenge, when our numbers increase hugely and each year we hope that no one will require the use of a tractor after the service to drag them out of the mud!!! We are conscious that, in keeping the car park closed, we are restricting its use for those who would like to park there and enjoy local walks.

The PCC of St Andrew's is now in a very fortunate position in that we have the funds to improve the car park. Having taken advice, this will need to involve a permanent hard core and possibly shingle embedded on top. We would delimit the carpark with 'sleepers' hoping that the final effect will be in keeping with the rural nature of the churchyard and do everything to maintain the beauty of the setting. The sleepers will mark the break between the car park and present line of newest graves. We will, of course, be following

due process and will obtain quotes and necessary permissions from the Diocese.

If anyone in the village would like to chat to us about this, we would welcome comments, experience and names of contractors that villagers have used. We know that the east end of the churchyard will look a little different as a result of this work but our aim is to enhance the use of the churchyard and church, and make the car park a facility for all in the community, and beyond, to enjoy.

#### **Operation Randall – wildlife crime update**

It has been an incredibly varied month. We have managed to □nalise an investigation in relation to destruction/disturbance of a protected European species, namely Great Crested Newts. This work required a licence from Natural England which is now in place and restorative work has been carried out.

A donation to a local wildlife charity has been paid as part of a community resolution. If you plan to carry out any work that requires or likely to require a licence, please make sure the licence is fully in place before work is carried out.

We have also had a number of reports of nesting birds being disturbed and destroyed. These can be incredibly frustrating crimes to deal with as we need to prove the nest is active. That said we have

stepped into contacting a few builders/developers where it looks like work is going to be carried out damaging such nests these have including seagulls, house sparrows and blue tits over this month. All nests are protected whilst being built or active, they cannot be removed until the end of the season around the end of August. Also, we had a slightly unusual call when a landowner was accused of damaging some bluebells whilst replacing an old worn-out track. Whilst bluebells are protected under the Wildlife and Countryside Act, they're an exception under the legislation and protected from being offered for sale and linked offences rather than like many of the other plants listed under the act from destruction.

## The thrill of success after finding out you've been doing it wrong all these years...

I've always enjoyed making things with wood. Whether or not it has ever qualified as 'proper' carpentry is a moot point; nothing I've ever cobbled together would excite a fan of Chippendale or Hepplewhite. Or even IKEA. It is not for want of ambition. When I was at school. I went into woodwork class with an order from a customer in the bag already - mum wanted a fender stool, three feet long, a foot wide, in mahogany, with Queen Anne legs. The woodwork master, Jack Green, was delighted that someone wanted to do something other than a shelf and so I set to work. I had done most of the complicated stuff and more or less assembled the piece when the school year ended and I left, but it wasn't quite finished. The stool went into the garage where woodworm pretty much ate the lot.

Over the years I've made various things, some of which have even ended up being used in the house. I have an issue with scale; a bookcase for a few paperbacks became big enough to house a chunk of the British Library collection, a cabinet for a small corner expanded to a size large

enough to rent out as an AirBnB. And nothing I've made was ever done properly – wonky cuts, not a square edge in sight and no joints which were not held together with screws, big nails or half a pint of strong glue.

Finding myself at a loose end after departing from the world of work, I spotted an ad for free adult learning courses from Norfolk County Council. What's this? Basic bench carpentry? Why not? And so I presented myself at a brand-new, brilliantly-equipped construction training facility in Hellesdon on a Monday evening for the first of six three-hour sessions. The basic course really is basic how to hold a saw properly, for instance. But I discovered that I have been doing it wrong for the past 45 years (sorry Mr Green) and

exulted in suddenly being able to cut wood in a straight line. We were shown the essentials of working with hand tools, marking out, making proper mortice and tenon joints, how to use a chisel to chop out wood. All good stuff. We were let loose on a project of our choice and, yet again, ambition reared its head. An order for a side-table, Scandi-style, with gently splayed white oak legs and a ply top, came in. But this time, thanks to the help of the tutor, the time to do it and the increased knowledge, I did it properly.

In the interests of transparency, I should say that I did do some of the work at home and did use a power tool (a router to shape the edges of the top and the legs) but the rest was hand-made with not a nail or screw in sight.

If I may be so immodest, I think it looks pretty decent. Sure, if you look closely you'll see the odd wobbly line or slight gap, but it's a functional and not unattractive piece. And it didn't end up being much bigger than planned. At the time of writing, I'm in the middle of the intermediate course - still free - and not making a bad fist of the task we have been set creating a carpenter's box. Where I go from there I'm not sure, but I'll have a look through the 449 courses on offer and see what I fancy. I've always liked the idea of pottery...

Please ensure that if you have a public right of way next to or through your property that it is kept clear from obstructions to allow walkers to enjoy these paths. Some paths cross, or are between fields, and we ask landowners to ensure that they remain accessible.

#### **Amenity areas**

Colton amenity area has had an 'upgrade'! The parish council is pleased to announce that through the fundraising efforts of Elona Moore and community infrastructure levy funds, the area is now equipped with a nest swing and a slide. The parish council would like to thank Elona for raising the money that has helped allow these improvements. Take a visit and enjoy this lovely area.

## Calling all residents – your village needs you!

The villages of Marlingford and Colton are served by a single parish council, which has an important role in oversight of issues such as highways and planning applications, along with responsibility for care of the amenity and play areas. Councillors have no political affiliation. Serving on the council is a rewarding experience, getting to know the residents and helping to maintain a sense of community in our villages.

I feel the time has come for me to step down, after having served for almost eight years on the council, much of that time as either chair or vice-chair. With increased pressure of work at the university, I was not going to stand for re-election this summer, but that would have left the parish council with no representative from Marlingford. I have decided that to step down in March 2024 to allow time for other Marlingford residents to volunteer to serve our village. We have a great set of councillors from Colton but there are three vacancies, so new volunteers could be co-opted onto the council.

This would allow a transition period while I am still vice-chair of the council. It would be a real shame if no one from Marlingford was prepared to serve on the council. Please consider offering yourself for co-option onto the parish council as it is important both villages are represented. If you would like to find out more about it, please come along to one of our meetings on July 11th or September 12th. The former meeting will be held at Marlingford Cricket Club, the latter at Colton village hall.

#### Paul Hammerton (Vice-Chair, Marlingford and Colton PC)

Clerk's note: The parish council currently has four members and is able to have a maximum of seven so we are looking at filling three vacancies. There will be a further vacancy in the spring when Paul Hammerton steps down.

#### **Bus Services**

Following a consultation process, Norfolk County Council is proposing some changes to the bus timetables serving Colton and Marlingford, which are due to take effect from September.

The council recognises the importance of rural transport and subsidises contracts for services at an average cost per passenger journey to reflect this. For example, a service may cost £10 per passenger journey. If it's the only

service for that community then the case to maintain the service is greater. The service to Longwater offers two different travel times. On Tuesday's there will be a bus at 09:32, returning at 11:15 or on Thursdays at 09:32, returning at 12:50, both with the option of connecting to the Konect 4 service which serves the city centre via the hospital. This would take 1 hour 45 minutes in the city centre. These times will not suit everyone but the council believes they are reasonable. There will also continue to be a pre-book service to Wymondham on Mondays but no longer on Fridays. This is unfortunate because it means prospective passengers can't use the service to attend the Friday farmer's market in Wymondham. The county council recognises this means a change in routine for some passengers. However, they have considered such adjustments in the context of a wider review of services throughout the county and conclude it's not always possible to keep all services and timetables the same when making wider changes. The parish council would like to hear from residents about the acceptability of these proposed changes in order to provide feedback to the county council.

#### Parish council meetings and public inclusion

Parish council meetings are usually held on the second Tuesday of the month at 7pm.

The next meeting will be held on:

- Tuesday July 11, 7pm, at Marlingford Cricket Club (pictured right)
- Tuesday September 12, 7pm, at Colton village hall.

At each meeting there is an opportunity for members of the public to speak and raise any issues they may have. You are also welcome to simply come along and listen. Councillors look



forward to welcoming residents to the next meeting.

#### If you need me – just let me know

Once upon a time, a vicar had a single parish where he would spend his days riding his bicycle round the village, visiting the two hundred or so households in his care, writing sermons and spending copious amounts of free time writing books or commentaries, discovering new plants and insects or, in Grantchester anyway, solving murders! He knew everyone and everyone in the community attended church every Sunday (sometimes twice!), and knew him.

Sadly, those days are long gone.

Sadly, those days are long gone. In a recent article, I wrote that visiting people in times of darkness has been one of the greatest privileges of my ministry. Since I wrote that, I've been asked who it is that I visit so, as there seems to be some confusion, I thought I might explain.

Times have changed and we no longer look back with rose tinted glasses. I have four parishes in the benefice and a housing estate which has 900 homes in my care. It is impossible for me to know everyone and what is going on in each of those homes. I rely on others from the church community in each parish to let me know if someone would like me to visit

which they do very well, though sometimes, someone gets missed. I also have to rely on people taking the initiative to ask me themselves which, I appreciate, can be a difficult step.

Times have also changed in terms of people's religious beliefs – we have multiple faiths reflected in our benefice. Most of you reading this do not attend church on a regular basis and many of you will have no faith at all.

Church used to be a place where people came together and needs were shared. That remains true for those who are part of the worshipping community across the benefice, but church is something most people have chosen to 'opt out' of these days because it no longer reflects something that is real or important to them. Not everyone wants a visit from a vicar and especially not in times of crisis or difficulty –

I know people who would think this offensive, or even manipulative. Times also changed in terms of COVID-19. It is easy to forget that restrictions only lifted early last year and that, for example in our benefice, we cancelled larger Christmas services in 2021 for fear

of Omicron. For many, it seems a dim and distant memory. But even now, while for the majority of us life has returned to normal, there are people for whom it is a real risk to invite a stranger into their home who may have come into contact with the virus.

So the answer is actually a really simple one – I happily visit anyone who asks me to!

Thankfully there are many people willing to ask one of their churchgoing neighbours to contact me or who contact me directly.

I am happy to simply chat, or to bring home communion if you cannot get to church for mobility or health reasons. In fact, the benefice has a visiting team who would be happy to come out and see you if you don't want a visit from the actual vicar!

So please don't sit in silence hoping that somehow I will just know you want me to visit – reach out and I will pop round.

I won't promise to have any answers to what you are going through, but I can sit and listen and pray with you.

For all the reasons given above please do not refer anyone to me without checking with them first, but if you do know someone who asks you to arrange a visit from me, then that's brilliant – my details are in *The Grapevine*, *The Bawburgh News*, the Diocesan Website, A Church Near You website, and in every church porch.

Please do get in contact - mine's a coffee, white with one!




