

Know any useful tips you can share?

I'm sure we all have little tricks for making life easier. Here are a few. 1 Avoid losing your gardening hand tools by tying a brightly coloured ribbon to them so that you can always spot them among the bushes and weeds.

2 Try cracking eggs on a flat surface to avoid breaking the yolk.

3 Discover **maps.me** – an app that gives you maps anywhere in the world and guides by satellite rather than being connected to the internet. You need to be connected to the internet initially to download the app and the maps of the area you require but after that, you're away and it's very reliable.

4 Apple Airtag is a small disc you can attach to your luggage, handbag etc. Then download the app '**Find My**' from the App store or the Playstore. It's good for finding all sorts of devices, items and people and can be used to track your luggage just in case it gets lost.

5 what3words - This has been featured before in *The Grapevine* but now, police, ambulance and fire services are using this app to pinpoint people in an emerger and find their location. The appris designed to identify any place on the surface of the earth. It works by dividing it up into approximately three metre squares. The system encodes geographic co-ordinates into three, permanently fixed dictionary words. For example, the front door of 10 Downing Street in London is identified by

///slurs.this.shark.

By putting these three words into the app on your phone, it will navigate straight to that location. This is especially good for delivery drivers as many of the properties in our villages have house names and share the same postcode, so giving them the 'three words' of your address means they can easily locate you.

Try for yourself – download the app and then see if you can identify these three well-known locations:

Bluebell woods.


but it is an offence to uproot any wild plant. Bluebells are afforded additional protection so enjoy the spectacle but please do not take these wild flowers.

Health and Well-being

Menscraft is a men's mental health and wellbeing charity. Steve Hunt, the charity's Breckland co-ordinator, tells you more about it.

"The charity is run by a nonclinical team based at Norwich's Maddermarket. We know rural isolation and mental ill health exists in our rural communities, and Menscraft runs a variety of activities and programmes. As well as providing one-to-one support for those facing life's challenges, they also run social groups called Pit Stops, and around these, other activities and programmes such as fishing, walking, snooker, music appreciation, woodland experiences, and anything else you can think of or suggest.

There are 13 Pit Stops running weekly across Norfolk and I run the Dereham branch on Tuesday 2-4pm

at the Memorial Hall, Watton on Wednesdays at The Charlotte Harvey Community Centre 2-4pm, and Thetford on Thursdays at the Charles Burrell Centre 2-4pm. The idea for the Pit Stop came about by using a metaphor for men and cars. "Some of us are old bangers (like me!), but there's room in our garage for shiny new models too. A lot of us need a good valeting... but, being blokes, we tend to put it off for as long as we can. We're not always that careful about the quality of the fuel we put in the tank and an oil change is overdue. Above all else, we need our Pit Crew: a group of other people to help maintain ourselves and enable us to be our best selves so that we can be better brothers. sons, partners and fathers." The Pit Stop brings men together through activities and conversation to build friendship, connection, and a sense of belonging. The inspiration for these Pit Stops is the idea of men functioning best when they have the solidarity of their own pit crew: other men who they can regularly check-in with for support, understanding, laughter, light-hearted and stimulating discussion and activity. Colton bikers Dom Castle and Darren Minns put on their Sunday best for the recent Norwich Distinguished Gentleman's Ride, part of a global event to help support men's health issues. The DGR is a series of motorcycle ride-outs; riders are encouraged to dress up for the event – tweed, cravats and moustaches are par for the course – and meet up with

other like-minded souls for a gentle trip into the country with many riders on classic or retro-styled machines. Dom and Darren joined 160 other bikers for a (slow) Sunday morning spin out from Norwich HarleyDavidson dealers Lind in Ber Street to Stody Hall gardens near Holt. "It was a great event," says Dom. "We had the weather, the outfits and the bikes and people seemed delighted to see the convoy rumbling along. With all the tweed we definitely looked more like the Mild Bunch than the Wild Bunch!" The Norwich DGR has raised around £17,000 so far.

Annual meeting of the council and Easton annual parish meeting

Both were held on 18 May 2023. The first item of business at the annual council meeting was to elect the new Chairman and Vice Chairman. Cllr Ben Moye was nominated and accepted the post of Chairman and Cllr Peter Milliken was duly elected as Vice Chairman.

The annual parish meeting followed and several members of the community attended, providing updates on the organisations they represented. The chairman of Easton Parish Council provided a report on the previous year. The minutes of these meetings will be available on the Easton Parish Council website and the chairman's report is provided below.

Chairman's Report

"It has been another busy year for Faston Parish Council. We have continued to work tirelessly in the best interests of parishioners. Firstly, I would like to thank councillors Milliken, McCarter and Lewis for putting their names forward for election. Secondly, when considering the amount of change in the village and the number of vocal residents. it was surprising and disappointing that no one else in the parish put themselves forward to be a parish councillor. The parish council has been operating efficiently with the aforesaid councillors and I hope we can continue in this manner. But we are only volunteers with jobs and commitments, and are therefore very stretched by our workload. We were disheartened

no other residents stepped forward in the interests of our community. At the end of my report last year, I identified five key priorities and we have made considerable progress in these, alongside other matters. **College Heights:** We have completed the improvements to the play areas. The new equipment makes use of the green space and has proved popular with the older



children in the village. **Traffic calming:** We continue to push for traffic calming measures along Dereham Road, the Longwater Interchange and Marlingford Road. The extension of the 30mph speed limit and the reduction of the speed limit from 60mph to 40mph will be coming into force along Dereham Road soon. We have also made several representations to improve the safety of the Longwater Interchange and Norfolk Showground entrance as part of the development of the Food Hall and Market Garden at the Norfolk Showground site. As part of the new Easton Community Centre, we will be making changes to Marlingford Road so it becomes safer for all. **Planning:** We have made numerous comments on planning applications of various sizes across the village. This includes small residential applications, the Food Hall and Market Garden development at the Norfolk Showground and the specialist school at the Diocese site.

Easton Community Centre:

Significant progress has been made building the new community centre. The delivery of the project has been hindered by South Norfolk District Council's disinclination to release their part of the funding for the project, but thanks to Councillor Milliken's tireless efforts we have now reached an agreement and the build-out of the scheme is continuing to progress. **Neighbourhood Plan Review:** The Neighbourhood Plan review has made substantial progress and the proposed updates to the document underwent consultation for six weeks earlier in the year. The comments received are being reviewed before an updated Easton Neighbourhood Plan is submitted to South Norfolk District Council. Going forward we will:

• Continue in discussions to improve the Longwater Interchange and other areas of the parish where there are traffic problems

• Continue to act in the best interests of the village when responding to planning applications

• Complete the construction of the new community centre

- complete the review of the Neighbourhood Plan

• Establish the management of the new community centre Finally, I would like to extend my gratitude to Councillor Milliken for all his efforts over the last year, especially in relation to the new community centre. The time and effort devoted to the project, especially in relation to the funding issues, have been instrumental in the its delivery.

I would like to thank Councillor McCarter for his work on the new community centre and his indefatigable litter-picking efforts, and Councillor Lewis for his work monitoring the defibrillators across the parish. Finally, I would like to thank our parish clerk Gina for her support over the last year. We have also received assistance from other individuals, but I cannot name everyone, what I can confidently state is that without this small group of dedicated people the parish of Easton would be a worse place."

Celebrating two special Norfolk people

On May 8 this year, it was 650 years since the Lady Iulian of Norwich had a near-death experience with visions taking her to the crucifixion of Jesus and impressing on her the ever-present love of God. Iulian wrote the words of her Revelations of Divine Love and we still read them today. Her name is taken from the dedication of the church of St. Iulian, which still exists between Rouen Road and King Street. Like others at that time she opted to live in a small room attached to a church, becoming an anchoress, a person of deep spirituality and from her window to the alley outside she gave counselling to those who came to her in trouble and distress. Norwich was prosperous and creative then, but there were wars, outbreaks of plague and the Peasants' Revolt. People would be fearful of rough justice in this world and the next. But Julian gave hope with words such as these:

'Because of our good Lord's tender love to all those who shall be saved, he quickly comforts them, saying "all shall be well, and all manner of thing shall be well".

This year is also more than 1,000 years since St Walstan was born. He came from Bawburgh, brought up in rich surroundings, but at the age of 12 gave up his privileged position and left home, walking to Taverham to take up work as a farm labourer.

He gave all his possessions away to the poor and worked hard on the farm for over 30 years.

There were stories of sick animals being brought to him for healing, and people claimed to have been cured through his prayers. He was rewarded with a cow which gave birth to two white bull calves and he was given a small cart. He had been told in a vision from God that he should keep these and then he was told that he was about to die; a spring of water appeared. He died on May 30, 1016; he had asked his fellow workers to put his body on the cart and allow the oxen to wander at will. They moved as far as Costessey, another spring appeared, then on to Bawburgh where the spring, known as Saint Walstan's Well is today.
